Please join us for a one-hour webinar on the new
POGO Guideline for the Prevention of Acute Nausea and Vomiting due to Antineoplastic Medication

The purpose of this webinar is to provide nurses who care for children aged 1 month to 18 years who are receiving antineoplastic medication with an approach to the prevention of acute antineoplastic-induced nausea and vomiting (AINV). The scope of this guideline is limited to the prevention of AINV in the acute phase (within 24 hours of administration of an antineoplastic agent). Its scope does not include anticipatory, breakthrough or delayed phase AINV, or nausea and vomiting that is related to radiation therapy, disease, co-incident conditions or end-of-life care. This guideline is most applicable to children who are naïve to antineoplastic therapy and who are about to receive their first course of antineoplastic therapy.

She is currently the clinical manager of the Haematology/Oncology pharmacists and has a clinical practice in pediatric Haematology/Oncology and bone marrow transplantation. She chairs the Antiemetic Committee of the Children's Oncology Group, and co-chairs the Pharmacy Research Committee of the Children's Oncology Group, the Supportive Care Committee of the Pediatric Oncology Group of Ontario and the Guidelines Committee of the C¹⁷ Research Network. She is a member the Pediatric Expert Advisory Committee of Health Canada, Health Products and Food Branch. Lee's research activities have focused on supportive care in cancer and bone marrow transplant, particularly on optimizing the use of drugs in the prevention and management of chemotherapy-induced nausea and vomiting, infection, and the complications of bone marrow transplant. Lee has authored many original publications, clinical practice guidelines and book chapters and has presented internationally on aspects of the supportive care of children with cancer.
